BE PREPARED

Are you prepared in the case of an emergency? Being prepared is important not only for you, but also for your livestock. Here are a few key tips to help:

1. Create a Livestock Emergency Plan.

Do you know how to protect your farm animals from risks posed by natural disasters, including collapsed barns, freezing weather, flooding, dehydration, and electrocution? Have a plan in place that will help you know what to do, where to go, and who to contact, and that includes for your animals. Prepare a livestock emergency kit. A list of suggested contents is provided on the next page.

2. Make your own household emergency plan.

3. Build a 72-hour emergency kit.

Put together a 72-hour kit for both home and vehicle. Have the appropriate supplies on hand from food and water, to batteries and candles, and even extra pet supplies.

Livestock Emergency Kits

Make an emergency kit so you have emergency supplies in one location, and let everyone know where it is. Check and update contents regularly.

Include the following items and personalize according to your needs.

- Current list of all animals, including their location and records of feeding, vaccinations, and tests. Make this information available at various locations on the farm.
- Supplies for temporary identification of your animals, such as plastic neckbands and permanent markers to label animals with your name, address and telephone number.
- Basic first aid kit.
- Handling equipment such as halters, cages, blankets and appropriate tools for each kind of animal. Include boltcutters to quickly free animals in an emergency.
- Water, feed and buckets. Tools and supplies needed for sanitation.
- Emergency equipment such as a cell phone, flashlights, portable radios (with weather radio band) and/or weatheradio, and batteries. Know the weather radio broadcast frequencies and local weather information telephone numbers.
- Other safety and emergency items for your vehicles and trailers.
- And, remember food, water and emergency supplies for your family
